The meeting started at 10:15

Introductions and flying histories/stories were shared.

Lynn outlined future plans, beginning with the taco bar lunch following the meeting.

The March meeting is in Pendleton, though we do not have a location yet. Lindsay or Cassidy were going to set that up. The airport cafe, Elvis', might be able to host us. (541-276-3104, opens at 11:00)

Spring Northwest Section Board of Directors meeting is April 13 in Bellingham. Register by March 15.

Palms to Pines Air Race for 2024 will be August 8-10 from Santa Monica, CA to Madras, OR. Many of our chapter members are interested in doing this race. Lynn, Aileen, Sandra, Marjy, and Anne have done it in previous years.

The Northwest Aviation conference is next weekend, February 24-25. One of the speakers for our June 1 survival course, Andy Graham, will be presenting on February 24. The 99's have a booth and are often looking for volunteers.

Bonnie and Sue have organized a Mountain Flying course on May 11 at Pangborn Airport (KEAT). Long Bach Nguyen will come over to teach one day and fly the next.

Diane has secured lodging for us for the May 18 airmarking in Republic. Aileen is creating a supply list for this project.

Bonnie is in touch with the Airport Manager at Republic to coordinate everything. We will tentatively add Memorial Day weekend as a back up in case the 18th doesn't work (Lynn and Aileen unavailable Sat/Sun of Memorial Day Weekend.)

### **Survival Course Planning**

Gabriella is in contact with 2 sources for wrecked car for the survival demo. She is following up with possible costs and options.

### **Promotion**

Diane will follow up with REI to post a flyer and get possible donations.

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Marjy will follow up with EAA for promotion, possible breakfast service the Sunday after the overnight portion of the course, and maybe vans for transportation.

Marjy will collect electronic sponsor logos for use in program flyers, power point slides, FB page, etc.

Aileen can do W-9's for sponsors that want them for tax purposes.

Sandra will send the promotion spreadsheet to all members to select businesses and clubs to contact.

Home Depot and Lowe's are both known to donate and will have many items on our desired survival kit list.

Bonnie has checked on buses and the cost looks to be \$3,000 or so. We will use the Lambert's van and possibly rent another van to bring down/eliminate that cost.

John Arnold is looking for nearby lands to use for overnight portion.

Kate has researched box lunch options. We all agreed CG Public House is the best option. Cost is \$18-\$22 per person and they will deliver. A per person cost of \$30 includes delivery and providing of lunches for speakers and volunteers.

A discussion followed about the day-only price. Something between \$150 and \$200. Costs to us will be food, van rentals (?), and any swag we choose to give away that was not donated. (Bonnie offered to buy the vests for participants.)

We debated doing an early or late registration price. More popular was a late registration "penalty".

We need to close registrations in time to order food and set up transportation for the overnight portion.

We need to arrange something for the spotter plane or planes.

Meeting adjourned at 11:55 AM.

A fun weekend of walks, games, and many, many conversations followed. And, so MUCH great food!!

# DECODING METARS—WHAT DO ALL THOSE NUMBERS MEAN?



Does this make sense to you? Probably not. Did you know you can disregard almost half of the METAR report?

The meteorological reports have several components—the main weather section and the remarks section.

You've probably looked at the remarks section before and given up on trying to decode it.

There are two sections to the Remarks section: "Automated, Manual, and Plain Language Remarks" and "Additive and Automated Maintenance Data."

The Additive and Automated Maintenance Data section has "no direct impact on the aviation community."

This means you can disregard almost half of a METAR report. You are permitted to disregard the following confusing parts of a METAR:

RMK AO2 SLP088 P0002 60014 T00500050 10078 20050 51015

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Note: if you really must know what these mean, the "60014" means in the last 6 hours, 00.14 inches of rain fell.

The T00500050 is another way of telling you the temperature and dewpoint. The "0" stands for a positive number, so in this case, the temperature and dewpoint are both 5.0 degrees Celsius.

If you saw a T11001110, it would mean the temperature was -11.0 and the dewpoint was -10.0 degrees Celsius.

The P0002 means 00.02 inches of precipitation fell in the past hour.

There is one more piece of information that is cool to know, but useless to you as the pilot. That is the \$ at the end of the METAR. The \$ means the automated system needs maintenance.

## Not all of the Remarks section is useless.

The first couple of lines right after the "RML" usually contain good pieces of information.

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You will see variable ceilings, variable visibility when different types of precipitation began and ended, and significant cloud types.

In other words, it gives you additional information about the weather that the main report doesn't tell you.

Take this example for instance:

RMK AO2 CIG 035 RNW 34 SLP199 P003 60005 T00830050 TSNO

This means there was a Ceiling (CIG) at 3500 feet. You will only see this in the remarks section if that number is **lower** than the main report.

The main report showed a Broken layer of 4200 feet.

That 700-foot difference could be important!
